Michael Ajerman's oil paintings depict private moments of quiet domesticity and inner landscapes. His depiction of objects and bodies in flux employ a gestural style focused on colour and brushwork. Frequently populated by subjects real and fictional, his paintings are both intimate and expressive, funny and sinister, luscious and unexpected.

He was born in New York. As a teenager he took part in the Cooper Union Outreach Program. Afterwards studying at the Corcoran School of Art, the New York Studio School, along with the Yale Summer School at Norfolk. In 2003 he completed his Masters Degree at the Slade School of Art. Receiving the British Institute Award from the Royal Academy the same year.
